Risen!

In my prayer and in my preaching, I often explore stories suggested by scripture but not recorded. I wonder, "What's going on in the hearts and minds of the people in the crowd?" "What happened next in the life of the person healed by Jesus?" "What was it like for the disciples day in day out as they followed Jesus?"

Currently, the film *"Risen"* is playing at Hollywood Hits. It places us with Clavius, a Roman Tribune, at the foot of the cross, in Jerusalem, and around Judea and Galilee. Interspersing Biblical events with imagined scenes, we experience the forty days between Jesus' death and ascension as Clavius engages his mission of finding the body of Jesus. Pontius Pilate and the Chief Priests fear the instability that rumors of a missing body might prompt. Political and religious leaders want the body found so that they can defuse Jesus' power by demonstrating that the popular preacher and healer is, indeed, dead and gone.

We see Clavius unsettled as he looks into the eyes of Jesus as he hangs dying on the cross. Clavius doesn't know what to think when he discovers the Risen Jesus breaking bread with his followers in the Upper Room. Jesus says, "Come and join us, brother. There are no enemies here." Having seen Jesus dead and yet alive, sharing a meal with his followers, he does not hand Jesus and the disciples over to his fellow Roman soldiers but still he cannot make sense of what he has seen.

As he follows the disciples to Galilee, he knows that his life is changed forever. He abandons his secure life as a successful Roman soldier and leader for an uncertain future. He has seen the Risen Lord who knows his hopes and fears. Nothing can ever be the same again; yet, what does it mean to believe? What does it mean to follow Jesus?

The film leaves us with these questions as it begins and ends with the Tribune taking off his ring, which symbolizes Roman position and power. As I watched, Clavius' journey through the forty days it struck me that we tend to have the same questions he had.

On Easter, we joyfully celebrate that Christ is risen. We proclaim in word and song, "death is conquered, we are free, Christ has won the victory." Yet, this truth didn't change any of the material realities of Clavius or the disorganized, frightened, and confused disciples nor does it change any of the particulars of our lives.

So what difference does Easter make? How would our lives and our community be different if we lived by the law of love every day? What would happen if we let go of our striving and conniving, and trusted God to lead us? How might God speak to us if we dedicated ourselves to reading scripture or regular contemplative prayer? What works of charity or justice might connect us more deeply with God's dream for humanity?

Join us this Eastertide taking on the Fifty Day Bible Challenge. Explore the life and ministry of Jesus and let his kingdom values change you forever. Don't just shout "Alleluia! He is risen..." Live it!

Dear Friends,

After celebrating the Sabbath with friends and family, a small group of women headed to the tomb that held Jesus' body. With them they carried ointments and cloth to prepare his body for final burial. The sun had set, the day was coming to an end and darkness had overtaken the land. We can be sure this outer darkness mirrored the inner darkness of their grief.

This grief was quickly turned into worry when they saw the open, empty tomb. This worry then turned into amazement as they began to understand that Jesus' body hadn't been stolen but had been resurrected from death and back into life. There was no longer any need to mourn their friend's death. God had interceded in the world in a new way by raising Jesus after his gruesome murder.

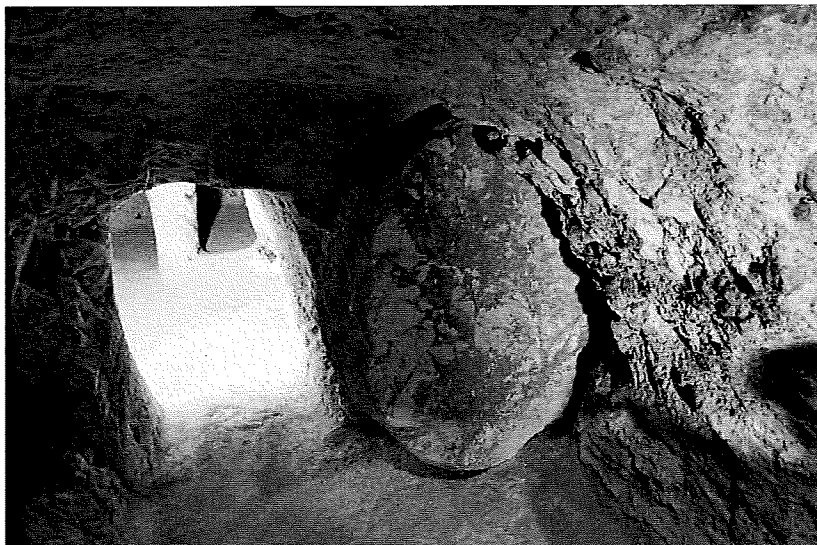
I had never thought much about the empty tomb until I visited a tomb in Nazareth. Below the Sisters' of Nazareth Convent is a maze of caves, walkways and the tomb pictured picture below. The tomb was constructed sometime in the first or second century and is similar to the tomb Jesus would have been placed in shortly after his death. The boulder serving as a door rolls in and out of a narrow hole in the rock. The tomb opens into a small area which is surrounded by smaller spaces to hold the bodies. In this way families could be buried together in one tomb.

As you can see this tomb is empty (except for the lighting installed for better viewing). Being this close to a tomb resembling Jesus' tomb gave me a new appreciation of the meaning of the "empty tomb." For those women coming to the tomb its emptiness became the cause of ecstatic joy. It meant that Jesus was still a part of their community and their lives. In my own life emptiness has a more negative connotation—it means loss or despair. So I do my best to avoid emptiness whether it's in my stomach or my mind or in my heart. I fill myself with food, television, work, noise, video games etc...all so that I don't have to feel that loss or despair. Despite my repeated attempts I can't fill this emptiness.

The story of Easter reminds us that emptiness can serve as an open space for God to enter into our lives. The empty tomb wasn't a sign of Jesus' absence, but rather a sign of his ongoing presence. And so we don't need to fear the emptiness or struggle to fill it. The emptiness will not overtake us. We need to sit with it and trust that God will fill it just as God filled the empty tomb.

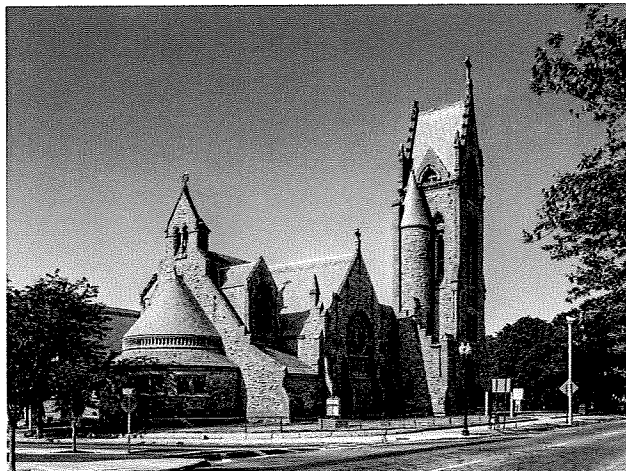


LEADERSHIP AND LIFE AT ST. STEPHEN'S

VESTRY UPDATE. During March, Vestry members attended the Diocesan Learning Day “Real Church, Real Mission: Holy Practices for Vibrant Churches” with Rev. Molly Phinney Baskette.

A WORD FROM THE TREASURER. As we come to the end of the first quarter of the year, please remember to keep up with your pledge; for your convenience, pledge statements will be mailed in early April. In February, the Finance Committee met to discuss the Restoration Fund and our Endowment, and has been working since then to reach out to Eastern Bank, UBS Financial and our fund manager, the DeBurlo Group in order to ensure that our investments are growing for our future use. We also looked at TogetherNow disbursements and how we can best use these funds to pay off the \$400,000 loan that we opened in 2013. Given the importance of TogetherNow pledges paying off the loan, we encourage all pledgers to honor your pledge commitment and, if you are confused about what you still owe, contact the Diocese at 617-482-5800 and ask to speak to Lynd Matt (lmatt@diomass.org).

SCAFFOLDING RETURNS. As we move past Easter and Spring comes to Massachusetts, scaffolding returns to the church. Thanks to a grant from the Diocesan Closed Church Fund, the Massachusetts Historical Commission, and the Yvonne and Earl Wing Bequest, we continue work to stop leaking in the cupola and sacristy hallway. In addition, work will begin soon on restoration of all the Tiffany windows in the chancel.

14th ANNUAL SOUL CELEBRATION ON MAY 1. Our Soul Celebration seeks to celebrate African American culture, focus attention on community concerns, and raise money to support the ministries of St. Stephen’s. We need everyone’s help organizing, advertizing, soliciting ads, selling tickets, cooking, singing, and showing hospitality if we hope to achieve our trinitarian goals. BCH CAMP ONLINE REGISTRATION IS OPEN NOW! This year the Barbara C. Harris Camp (for Family Camp and Summer Camp for grades 4-12) has switched to online registration, which is available and open at <https://bchcamp.campbrainregistration.com/>. Printed Camp brochures and registration instructions are available in the Galahad Area for families who were not able to attend the Camp Night. Summer Camp costs \$600 per week, per child. The Camp asks each family to pay what you can BUT scholarships are available and no child will be deprived a week at Camp because of inability to pay. Diocesan scholarships look to the family, the church and the Diocese each paying 1/3 of the cost. This means that the requested minimum family share is \$200. If a family cannot pay \$200, a letter explaining why you can't pay needs to accompany the regular Camp Scholarship Form, which St. Stephen's clergy must sign unless you pay the full \$600. Camp transforms the lives of young people; St. Stephen's and the BCH leadership remain committed to making Camp accessible to all children. **Sign up NOW because some weeks are almost full.** Bring your Camp questions to Rev. 

VOLUNTEER THIS SUMMER IN OUR COMMUNITY PROGRAMS WITH KIDS. For more than a decade, St. Stephen's has sponsored Kids in Community (KIC) a 4-week, free summer camp for elementary-age children. KIC now serves 120 children and employs 23 youth and young adults in addition to KIC Director Audrey Gutfreund. **KIC needs adult volunteers to help prepare meals & snacks, read with children, teach a craft or skill, or provide extra hands around camp. While some may be able to volunteer daily or weekly, St. Stephen's is taking on all facets of volunteering for Week One of KIC—July 11-15.** Last summer St. Andrew's Marblehead piloted KIC-Congregation Volunteer Week, and this year we hope to recruit a local congregation for each week of camp to supplement our faithful St. Stephen's regulars. Plans are also underway for our second summer of our Academic Enrichment program for 1st-3rd graders. From 2:30-5:30 Monday through Thursday, Micheal Brown coordinates a team of young adult interns and parish volunteers in strengthening literacy and math skills of some of our most vulnerable students. **There will be a volunteer orientation for our summer programs with kids later in the spring.**

FOOD PANTRIES NEED EXTRA HANDS. The Greater Boston Food Bank's Mobile Market will be open on Saturday, April 2 from 7:00-11:00am at St. Mary's. The Mobile Market is a great community event with people of all ages working together to organize, bag, and distribute food to more than 400 people. Thanks to GBFB, St. Mary's/ Sacred Heart, the Lynn Hunger Network, and Catholic Charities, we have weathered the winter and provided food for families despite the closing of two pantries last summer and hope to open a new Lynn indoor food center this Spring. **And please help our Pantry distribute food and read with kids on Friday afternoons (except first Fridays), 3:00-4:00!**
