## Vessels of God's Love and Care

Each October, as Pledge Season begins at St. Stephen's, I find myself giving thanks for the committed and creative work of the Stewardship Ministry Team. This dedicated group—Irene Axelrod, Lucinda McClain, Dorothy Post, and Susan Rosevear-- works year 'round to offer programs and engage conversations highlighting our responsibility as "stewards of God's creation." They've offered workshops on end of life issues, and financial planning; they've convened study groups on the theology of money; and they've helped us reflect on our bodies as "temples of the Holy Spirit." But October is when their work comes front and center as we launch our annual financial pledge drive.

Each year they need to pull together speakers, stories, visual images, and letters to motivate each of us to make a financial commitment to St. Stephen's. They know that our budget depends on the campaign being successful; they understand that one of every five dollars we spend comes directly from the pocket of a parishioner.

Each year we all worry that we have used up all the good themes and that we won't find powerful speakers to offer reflections on why they pledge. Yet, as I sat at a meeting with them last week listening to them tell stories of the people and programs of this parish, and reflect on being "vessels of God's love and care," I realized the well would never run dry.

Together, we reflected on Romans 5:5-- "God's love has been poured into our hearts." God fills us with holy love so that we might love others. Sometimes we are the one who needs to receive a little love and care; other times we are the one who can pour out the love. But, here at St. Stephen's, the vessels of God's love and care are all around us. We focused on the baptismal font where water pours and blesses. We moved on to the Eucharist in which the wine and bread bring us into full communion with Christ. We remembered the pitchers of oil blessed by the Bishop for use in healing prayers. We thought about the disciples' fishing vessels on the Sea of Galilee and our church shaped like a ship to carry us through both the still waters and the storms of life. We talked about the pitchers, platters, pans, and plates of food and drink for youth groups, fundraisers, study groups, and parish parties. And we discussed all the bags of groceries given to people in need. But then we also remembered trash barrels filled with dripping water and buckets of sand and salt at every door.

All of them are vessels of God's love and care that touch and transform our lives here at St. Stephen's. We are blessed to be, to have, and to hold such abundant vessels of God's love and care. With the gifts God has given us, we have all we need to be the people and the church God wants and needs us to be. All that is required is for each of us to give generously in thanksgiving for the many ways we are blessed.

*In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was in the beginning with God. All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. (John 1:1-4)*

Dear Friends,

“Is your parish a bible-based church?” Hearing this question makes me grit my teeth and bite my tongue to avoid giving a sarcastic reply. In the last few years it has become important to differentiate between churches that are based on the Bible and churches that are based on something else. Now I have no idea what that something could be, but clearly it’s unacceptable. It’s also unclear to me what it means to be a “bible-based church.” Reading scripture in worship? Living according to the Jewish laws in the Hebrew Bible/Old Testament? Requiring that women wear head scarves in church?

The Gospel of John provides one possible answer in the above passage. John, in his usual poetic style, describes the intimate nature between the Word and God. It is impossible to separate the two as they are intricately woven together and have been since before creation. But the Word and God don’t remain hidden in a galaxy far away. God shares the Word with the People as they wander to Egypt and back to Canaan and as they build the Kingdoms of Israel and Judah. Writers, poets, prophets, kings all speak the Word of God. Then, as we read in John 1:14, this Word becomes flesh in Jesus Christ. The Word takes on a new form so that all can hear its message of peace and love. Empowered through the Holy Spirit, Jesus brought the Word to life as he traveled and taught in the region of Galilee. Fortunately this Word was passed down through the generations through the books of the Bible. So even though we didn’t walk with Jesus in the deserts and towns and cities, we can still hear and respond to the Word.

For me this is the litmus test for a “bible-based church.” It’s a church that reveres the Bible as the living and breathing Word of God. It’s a church that hears the Word and excitedly rushes out the doors to tell their families, friends and strangers. In my heart I know that the Episcopal Church and St. Stephen’s is one of these churches. It’s often joked that Episcopalians don’t know the Bible because in worship we use only the Book of Common Prayer. And yet all of the prayers, creeds, and litanies in the Prayer Book come directly from the Bible—Genesis, Isaiah, Psalms, the Gospels, the Letters of Paul. When we worship we are hearing, reading and speaking the Word of God. It opens us to experience the Word of God within the sacred space of a worshipping community.

In the context of worship the Word reveals who we are and whose we are in relation to God. This month we begin our *Living Word* worship which will be on the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of every month. On Sunday, October 18 our entire community—children, youth, adults, elders—will gather for a worship service that heightens our awareness of the presence of the Word of God. The structure of our worship: collect, lessons, prayers, confession, Eucharist will remain the same. How we engage the separate pieces of the structure will be different. The Gospel may be acted out by our high school youth and our prayers may be written by the Bible Study Group.

Whatever changes we make will be for two goals: to integrate all the generations in worship and to bring the Word of God to life. So we invite you to “try on” this worship. Open your hearts and your minds to what the Word may be saying to you and to our community.

## A NOTE FROM THE SENIOR WARDEN

Have you seen the Sacristy floor and the Cloister hall way? If you have not seen the floors please go, look and walk on the beautiful old original restored floor in the Sacristy and the new wood floor in the hall way. The ice and snow are gone and work is mostly done. The insurance company was and continues to be helpful and supportive. Chris Trahan and Harry Jackson have worked with the construction company from the beginning. Thank you both and a special thanks to Harry for opening the building every day early in the morning.

The next phase of the major construction will be:

- a. The Sacristy roof
- b. Cloister hall way roof
- c. Three sides of the cupola
- d. Repointing of the knee wall
- e. Upper roof over the chancel, organ and piano.

We have one hundred thousand dollars from the Diocesan closed church fund, and another one hundred thousand dollars from the Wing Bequest. Jane and Chris, with help from others, applied for a grant from the Massachusetts Historical Commission's round 21: Massachusetts Preservation Projects Fund. St Stephens did receive a Fifty thousand dollar grant. This is a reimbursement grant and one half will be paid when we have spent \$50 thousand and the other half when all work is done. The total for the project is two hundred fifty thousand dollars.

The architect has drawn up plans for the above work. Construction bids are being acquired for the work. The bids will be submitted to the Massachusetts Historical Commission for approval, and we will select a contractor. The contractors need to be familiar with and skilled in historical building construction. The work will begin once this process has been completed.

It is a long process and you will know it is complete when construction companies are on the premises. If you have any questions please ask Chris Trahan or myself.

## STEWARDS OF RESOURCES

**VESTRY SUMMARY.** September 20 the Vestry met new Diocesan Intern Samantha Wolfe. Stewardship Ministry Team reported on theme “Vessels of God’s love and care”; Vestry set 2016 pledge goals of \$133,000 (average increase of 3%; ask for 5%) and at least ten new pledgers. August financials are strong except for lagging pledge payments (statements will go out by the end of September). Voted to use the bulk of the Wing Bequest (\$200,000) to support restoration work. Voted to approve revised employee handbook. The Fair (November 21) leadership team is in the midst of solicitations and asked all Vestry members to help. Reports on Youth Ministry, Church School, Gordon College interns, October 3 Diocesan Resource Day, and Beloved Community Campaign. The Rev. Louise Conant will be our Guest Preacher for Homecoming on September 27; the focus will be on St. Stephen’s as a mentoring community.

**STEWARDSHIP MINISTRY TEAM LAUNCHES “VESSELS OF GOD’S LOVE AND CARE”.** It’s October and speakers come to the lectern every Sunday to tell us why they pledge to St. Stephen’s. Soon, the Vestry’s letter asking each of us to pledge will arrive in the mail. Our response to the Vestry’s call to pledge generously determines the quality and shape of the ministry of St. Stephen’s in 2016. Please respond promptly to this holy invitation.

**TEACHERS AND CLASSES AWAIT KIDS OF ALL AGES!** Church School is back in full swing with energetic teachers and students ready for the new year! We are blessed with 6 young adults from Gordon College who will serve in all our Church. **DEEPENING COMMUNITY COMMITMENT**

**IT'S TIME TO SHARE THE WEALTH!** Better Transportation! Affordable, Quality Education! How? The Fair Share Amendment. This October, St. Stephen's, in partnership with ECCO and the Raise Up Massachusetts Coalition, will collect signatures to support the Fair Share Amendment. We know the hardships of insufficient funding for early childhood education, no summer school, expensive higher education, crumbling roads and bridges, and outdated public transit. Raise Up MA has proposed a constitutional amendment that would increase the tax rate for Massachusetts residents earning over one million dollars a year. The tax increase would affect only those with annual income over \$1,000,000 and would generate over \$1 billion in state revenue to support quality and affordable education and improvements in transportation. Last year our church collected hundreds of signatures to increase the minimum wage and gain earned sick time for all workers-- and we won! We can do it again! First, registered voters, sign the petition! We will have petitions available after worship every Sunday in October. On Sundays, October 3 and 18 St. Stephen's teams will carpool to local grocery stores to collect signatures! We can do this together!
